## SPECIFICATIONS:

- The height between the natural ground level and the top level of the floor slab is 300 mm .
- The height between the floor slab and the underside of the wall plate is 2600 mm .
- The roof is covered with tiles and is finished with a 220 mm wide fascia board.
- The ridge capping is 100 mm high.
- Rainwater down pipes are 75 mm in diameter and 100 mm square gutters are used.
- Rainwater down pipes should be placed on every corner of the building.
- The eaves overhang is 500 mm .
- The door is 2100 mm high and 900 mm wide.
- The doorstep is 150 mm high.
- The building has a hipped roof with a pitch of $30^{\circ}$.

The following must also be shown on the drawing:

- The method used to determine the roof height
- Window sills
- Any TWO rainwater down pipes on the elevation
- Print the title and scale beneath the drawing
